

Dear Friends,

With 2023 in the rearview mirror and 2024 upon us, let us take some time to reflect on what we accomplished together in the last year and what lies ahead. Our shared future is bright, and I am optimistic about the direction of Frederick Health. Here are a few important updates that I'd like to share.

We continue to grow to meet those changing needs as Frederick continues to grow. That includes working with both community partners and nationally recognized care providers. For the last two years, we have partnered with Community Radiology Associates (CRA) to continue providing high-quality outpatient imaging services. While this partnership has many benefits, I am happy to say that since this was initiated, we've seen a 40% increase in breast cancer screenings, with most results provided within 24 hours. This means we are catching cancer sconer in members of our community and taking the proper steps to keep them healthy.

Another partnership I'd like to share is that Frederick Health Hospice is expanding into Montgomery County, with an office soon opening in Rockville. Adventist Health System selected our excellent hospice team as their hospice of choice. Frederick Health Hospice will provide in-patient hospice services to Shady Grove Adventist Medical Center, White Oak Medical Center, and Montgomery County patient homes, helping expand access to this vital service.

As you know, we have recently opened two new locations in Emmitsburg and Brunswick. These fullservice centers provide a wide range of healthcare services including Primary Care, Urgent Care, Laboratory, Imaging, and Physical Therapy & Sports Rehab. Since these locations opened, they have cared for over 6,300 patients who otherwise would have sought care elsewhere or worse – not sought care at all. By bringing these excellent options to neighborhoods throughout Frederick County, we continue to be there when it matters the most.

I'd also like to personally thank everyone for their work and for helping us to earn high marks in the most recent Joint Commission survey. The survey team was at the hospital for several days, reviewing our protocols, validating our compliance, and analyzing our standards. These surveys are a lot of work but also very important. Not only do they inspire and improve quality and safety, but they also help instill confidence in our excellent work throughout the community. When the survey team said,

"... they'd bring their family here for care," I knew, as a team, that we had done a great job.

Retired with 33 Years of Service

January 19th, 2024 was the last work day for Sharon Hannaby, Director of Volunteer Services at Frederick Health before she was officially retired. It was a bittersweet day. After all, Sharon had been working on the job for 33 years, first as Volunteer Coordinator, then Acting Director, and then Director of Volunteer Services.

Sharon loved her job dearly and enjoyed working with volunteers and hospital staff. During her tenure she has expanded the volunteer program on site and off site. Under her leadership, the Junior Volunteer force doubled from around 30 in 1990 to around 60 in

2000 when she was the Volunteer Coordinator managing junior volunteers, and the total number of hospital volunteers reached almost 800, a pre-COVID-19 pandemic level, with junior and adult volunteers combined. It was a tremendous effort by the volunteers and saved the hospital over a million dollars each year.

Sharon's proudest accomplishment was the introduction of people with special needs to the hospital volunteer force. Sharon believes that everyone can serve their community including people with special needs. She worked with Frederick County Public School, Maryland School for the Deaf, Goodwill, and The Arc to recruit, train, and place people with special needs to volunteer at the hospital. This inclusive volunteering not only helps people with special needs build confidence but also job skills and work experience.

On all accounts, Sharon was most excited and thrilled to see those junior volunteers who came to volunteer at the hospital as high school student volunteers, then went to college and later chose medical careers. It tickled her profusely to see some of the student volunteers come back to work as nurses and became her colleagues.

Looking back, Sharon said she was extremely thankful for what the volunteers have done and for the good example they have set.

To Sharon, a new life begins at retirement. She will stay active by being a hospital volunteer herself.




We are always in need of new volunteers to work as regular clerks, substitute clerks, and donation sorters. If interested,

Fundraising Committee

The exciting and fun realm of Fundraising is happy to report that we have a full schedule of fourteen (14) vendor sales for calendar year 2024. We completed the 2023 year with a series of very successful vendor sales boosted by the addition of sales at The Village. The reception that the staff have given our vendors and volunteers working the sales has been overwhelming.

We kicked off 2024 with a uniform sale in the hospital cafeteria on Wednesday January 24th and Thursday January 25th. This was the first uniform sale in several years and we had a new vendor, Uniform Village from Cumberland, Maryland. The sale had payroll deduction and we enjoyed the return of this very popular sale that provided members of the hospital staff the opportunity to purchase necessary uniforms without having to travel to a distant retail location.

In the upcoming months of February and March we will have three (3) additional vendor sales. 

As a volunteer for the Infusion Therapy at the Cancer Center, she became a source of support to the nurses, staff, and patients. Her job includes going around patient care stations to talk with patients and provide them with pillows, blankets, snack, and drinks, sorting/stocking supplies in the supply room, disinfecting chairs and IV poles, etc. When in full capacity, Infusion Therapy can treat 24 patients. Thus, volunteers like Vicky are always busy. "We do everything we can to make patients comfortable during their treatment," said Vicky.

Being the Chair at the Infusion Therapy, Vicky also trains new volunteers to help them become familiar with the job. Recently she is working with Dennis Staley, a new volunteer who is excited to start his new journey there.

Volunteering at the hospital has given Vicky an enormous sense of satisfaction. "The best part of my volunteer experience is the wonderful feeling I get – feeling good to go in and leave; feeling helpful and appreciated," said Vicky.
